Dear Secretary Vilsack,

As organizations who advocate for fair and competitive markets for food and agriculture, we are writing to thank you for your announced plans to move forward with a set of three rulemakings to update and clarify aspects of the Packers and Stockyards Act (PSA) to address the treatment of livestock and poultry farmers by meatpackers, swine contractors and poultry companies. These reforms are long overdue, and it is critical that you move as expeditiously as possible to complete this rulemaking process.

Updating the PSA regulations is just one important step needed in building a more resilient food system to benefit farmers, workers and consumers.

Currently, a handful of corporations control our food from farm to fork. Over the past fifty years, control of our food system has consolidated under the control of fewer and fewer multinational agribusiness corporations.

Unchecked consolidation and vertical integration create a dramatic imbalance of power between producers and corporations, allowing corporations to manipulate the marketplace, push down the prices paid to farmers and ranchers, and drive them out of business.

It doesn't have to be this way; corporate consolidation and concentration in the food system is not inevitable. With enforcement of existing laws, rules and regulations, as well as new, forward-thinking policies, agencies can create open, transparent and competitive markets that benefit independent producers, rural communities, farm animals and eaters—not just corporate shareholders.

We look forward to working with you in support of meaningful reforms in the Packers and Stockyards Act regulations to ensure that our nation's livestock and poultry farmers have the opportunity to thrive in fair and competitive markets.
